

How did you get on with your New Year resolutions? Did any of them last more than a few days or hours? Well that seems to be par for the course!

Approximately 4000 years ago God issued a set of Commandments summarising His standards for human behaviour with the implication that if we obeyed them perfectly we would have the right to go to Heaven. Sadly none of us has ever fully obeyed all these Commandments - that is we have all sinned and so are justly deserving of His punishment and condemnation. We are all on the road to Hell, which is the place of rejection by God. God's standards are so high we find we cannot keep them just like our own resolutions. Just think of some of the Commandments you have not kept: - using God's name frivolously as a swear word or expletive? Committing adultery either actually or in thought? Stealing - even taking time off work that we are paid to do without permission? Being envious of someone else? This is also a sin in God's eyes. If you call in to either of our chapel buildings you will see these Commandments written on the walls, which are a reminder that we all need God's forgiveness. From Churston Vicarage

How do you tell the time? The easy answer is of course you look at your watch or a clock. But what I am asking has a potentially much deeper answer.

Clocks and watches are simply devices which measure out regular periods of time. We call them hours and minutes. Now as long as we all start at the same moment and as long as the units of time are measured accurately we can agree on what the time is. But suppose we want bigger "bits of time" days, months and years, and suppose we do not have the technology to produce clocks. What we need now is something which we can use to measure a regular "unit" of time and apply the same principle as before. One of the most obvious natural measures of time is the phases of the moon. The moon being "full" every twenty eight days. We call this period a lunar month and it is a much simpler and in many ways more accurate way of telling the time than having to remember that rhyme about "Thirty days hath September, etc". This latter works because we know it takes approximately 365.25 days for the earth to circle the sun (one year), we then split this into twelve sections (months) and vary the lengths of the months so that we end with a total of 365. Providing we all split the months up the same way we can all agree the same date. For most things in our modern world we rely on this type of calendar. However the date of Easter is worked out on a lunar calendar, which accounts for the fact it comes at a different "date" each year.

We do this because we know Jesus died during the Jewish festival of Passover, which for centuries was worked out on the phases of the moon. Which is more accurate? In the end it does not matter, the point is that at Easter we remember what Jesus did. He died, was buried and rose again and promises us he will come again, but we do not know when this latter will be. The secret of leading a good Christian life is to be ready for this coming again whatever date it is and whatever calendar God chooses to use to determine when it comes.

Neighbourhood Planning Survey

The finalization of Galmpton's submission to the Brixham and Peninsula Neighbourhood Plan is the overwhelming business in hand. In this we are greatly aided by the tremendous response to our village survey. 177 Questionnaires were returned. Most of the responses were what we might have guessed, but the survey gives us really valuable well-evidenced data, not only for the Neighbourhood Plan, but for relaying to the Council, Local Business, Health, and Care Authorities, in the next few years. We can speak with your authority. Thanks to everyone for this tremendous effort. The community spirit in the village always amazes! 134 people felt in touch and involved in the community. Here is a short summary of the main points (more information is on our website).

45 of respondents live in the Conservation Area, 35 in Langdon Lane and Langdon Fields, and 23 in the Galmpton Glade area. 89 were aged over 65, 69 aged 45-65, and 10 under 25.

Most people are strongly conservationist, concerned about the area, with very high scores for protecting the village surroundings, notably Galmpton Warborough Common(170) and the Conservation Area(162) and the Ring Road Fields (150). People wanted to maintain Galmpton's separate identity, and see little or no space for expansion without spoiling the AONB or important views. Probably for this reason, a sizeable minority felt Galmpton needed no additional housing (76) and were against subdividing gardens (113). A majority also felt any new building should match existing styles (124) and densities (152). However there was support for unmet housing needs within Galmpton for affordable homes (67) for young villagers, and homes suited for older or disabled (39), and 12 replies reported family having to leave the village through lack of affordable housing. Only the field adjoining Greenway Park (13), Kiln Road (13), and general "infill" (11) recurred as suggested locations. 112 replies reported a plethora of wildlife, of common animals (foxes, badgers, rabbits), birds (tits, magpies), reptiles (toads, slow worms), insects; some notable (deer), and some rare (bats, peregrines, and cirl buntings).

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We are a village of car users for all purposes, though about half also recorded walking for shopping, leisure and medical visits. Bus use (for shopping and leisure) was confined to about a third, and the main stimulus to increasing use would be stops in the village (83). There was some interest in a potential metro rail service (42 daily/weekly, 81 occasionally). A 20-mph speed limit in the village would encourage more walking (114) and cycling (64), as would more cycle paths (62), and a safer cycling environment (62).

Major traffic problems were seen as Dartmouth Road Junctions (134), Cars driving too fast (146), chaotic school traffic (132) and HGV's (102), and roadside parking (95) particularly by the schools and on Greenway Road by The Roundings.

Galmpton Shops are used daily/weekly by 147, equally for food, postal and papers, but Churston Broadway had only 79 daily/weekly patrons who mainly buy food. However most people go out of the village for their main shop (e.g. Sainsburys/Morrisons 143) for price and variety, and only 38 do it locally. There was some acceptance on balance for new Craft workshops (e.g. Yes 58, No 30), agriculture, Restaurant, Home-working, B & B, Stables, Boat businesses; but an Out-of-town shop (Yes 5 No 67), Takeaway, and Hotel were rejected. 17 people ran businesses mostly serving a wider area; Improved Broadband (15) and Small work units (9) were the most popular attractions to new business.

There was general satisfaction with access to health and social services particularly GP (134) and private dentist (97), but some difficulty getting a NHS Dentist (52). However 28 didn't like the GP appointment system. 19 suggested a lunch club or daycentre. Only 14 people needed daily care at home, but 35 reported disability, mainly mobility (26).

Many villagers enjoy open air recreations (e.g. 118 visit The Common daily/weekly), walking (132; 52 with dog), cycling (50), boating (44). 146 use public footpaths. Indoors they join in the History Group (30), Adult Education (26), Exercise/Dancing (24), W.I./Whist (19). Overwhelmingly people feel safe in the village; only 12 feel unsafe at night. Nevertheless 25 wanted more police foot patrols and there were concerns about "travellers".

The overall picture is of a village that is a community, concerned to protect its environment; elderly but active and articulate, both individually and in groups.

Annual General Meeting

The GRA AGM will be held on **Wednesday 13th March** at **7:00 pm** in the **Galmpton Village Institute** and all are welcome, particularly volunteers to be new committee members. We thank you for your subscriptions.

Residents Against Golf Club Sell-off R.A.G.S.

- The Planning Hearing scheduled for 14th January was cancelled because the Planning Application was withdrawn on 7th January by Bloor Homes.
- A new Application was submitted the same day and this shows alterations to the Clubhouse design.
- A Briefing to the Planning Committed is to take place on 29th January, at which RAGS and the Community Partnership will present details of the reasons for their objections to this Application.
- Our principal objections relate to traffic and access, impairment of visual amenity and noise regarding the Clubhouse location and the ecological impact and effect on the AONB and Coastal Preservation Area with regard to the Golf Course extension.
- As for the original Application this latest one relies upon land to be provided and managed in perpetuity as Mitigation for the impact upon Greater Horseshoe Bats and Cirl Buntings – both of which are protected species. The farmer of this land, Richard Haddock, has notified Torbay Council that he does not intend to sign the Section 106 Agreement. In the absence of his agreement the Application could not be approved by the Planning Committee as it would breach EU Regulations.
- RAGS continue to have confidence in the strength of our arguments and that these can lead to a rejection of this Application. Without Planning Permission residential development on the 1st/18th holes cannot take place.
- We understand that the Planning Application as submitted would bring about a
 major breach of the Terms of its Lease by the Golf Club. Torbay Council has
 advised the Club that they are required by the Lease to maintain an 18 hole
 Golf Course on the land that is leased from the Council. The current plan would
 reduce this to 16 holes and so risk forfeiture of the Lease back to the Council.
- The Conditional Contract signed by former Mayor Bye in 2010 is no longer capable of becoming Unconditional since it depends upon the siting of the Clubhouse within the AONB where Planning Permission was refused. In the absence of an amendment to this Contract the Parties cannot be bound by it, according to legal advice received by RAGS.
- RAGS have been fighting this cause now for 3 full years and we expect that the
 matter of development at Churston Golf Club will be decided by the time this
 copy of *THE GAZETTE* is published. We hope to look back and see that we have
 protected Churston for current and future generations to enjoy.

Churston Golf Course

Now soon into its 4th year, the saga continues to rumble on. The 11th March has been, as at time of writing, set as the date for the Planning Committee Meeting to consider the Club's proposals to relocate the clubhouse and car park to the site of the 3rd tee, adjacent to the junction of Bridge Road and Bascombe Road.

The update from RAGS (Page 22) sets out the position in detail – in short there are very strong planning reasons why this new application should also be REFUSED. It is a departure from the local plan, it will cause traffic problems, the list goes on.

We also need to be aware of the Flooding problems it would leave us with. There is Bat habitat mitigation proposed on land behind Churston village. However, this land floods from water which runs off fields leading up to Hillhead which meant in December, Bascombe Road was shut for 2 days and Elbury Lane was 4ft in water.

Our current draft of the Neighbourhood Plan proposes flood alleviation works to improve the drainage and resolve the problem. However, these would be specifically prohibited due to legal terms in the Bat habitat mitigation agreement.

Residents in the village have previously had their homes flooded out - Is it right that to simply extend the golf course they be put at risk of this happening again?

Neighbourhood Planning

The 7th November public consultation was well attended – thank you to those who came along. We have used your input to progress our plan, which by September 2013 will likely be the legal document used to assess planning applications and other proposals for our area. If we do not allocate where we do, or do not, want to see development, the Developers and the Council will do it for us – be warned!

There will be an opportunity to see the further draft of the plan, which incorporates your previous feedback, at our next public meeting.

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REVIEW OF 2012
